
It's summer, sweet summer!



## Both of your novels have been about teens. What did you write when you were a teenager?

Despite getting an A+ in Creative Writing, (which should have told me something,) I never wrote much as a teen, nor did I have aspirations of becoming a writer. In my mind, it wasn't possible for me to be an author—someone who wasn't on the newspaper committee, or had big college plans. These preconceived notions followed me for years until I finally realized that everyone has a voice worth sharing—even me.

#### When did you decide to be a writer, then?

The notion of being an author kept growing stronger during my twenties, but I brushed it aside because I had a very stressful job and young kids. But at the age of thirty, a severe migraine put me in the hospital and I realized it was God's way of telling me I needed to change my life. On that very day, I stumbled to my computer—half-zombied on painkillers—and started to write a mystery novel. And let me tell you, what I wrote was very amusing!
